New Caregiver Book

I never knew how aware my mother was that I was now her caregiver. I had taken parenting classes and heard many shiurim about kibbud av veim, but to this day I have never heard an explanation of how to take care of a parent as one cares for a child and still exhibit the honor one gives a parent.

One Friday night, as I was helping my mother get ready for bed, she gave a deep sigh. It was unlike her, and I asked her if something was wrong. She looked at me and said, "It's so hard..."

"What's hard, Ma?" I asked.

"It's so hard for you to take care of me."

It was the only time that my mother seemed to be aware that she needed my help. It was the only time she ever expressed it.

"Ma," I said, "That's what I'm here for. Whatever you need, I'm here for you. Nothing is hard. I'm your daughter, I'm here for you." That seemed to calm her.

I tucked her into bed and she said Shema. Then she said to me, "Goodnight, Mama."

This poignant memory was related by Mrs. Chaya Leah Rothstein, part of her description of her experience as a caregiver for her elderly mother. It offers but a small glimpse into the emotionally

laden challenge that caregiving presents. It is also a portrait that is not often shared. Life as a caregiver for a loved one can be lonely, overwhelming and unpredictable; yet there are so many individuals - professionals, rabbanim, and those who have navigated the experience themselves - who can offer support, both practical and emotional, to these courageous and dedicated caregivers.

Until now, however, no single book was available to offer guidance and chizzuk to frum caregivers. When Rabbi Elchonon Zohn, Director of the National Association of Chevrah Kadisha (NASCK), asked that we fill this need, it struck a chord with various staff members who themselves have dealt with this challenge. It also dovetailed with many of our other projects that offer support to those facing end-of-life situations. The result of Rabbi Zohn's suggestion is When Caring Counts Most: A Guide

for Jewish Caregivers. This soon-to-be-released anthology takes a multi-pronged approach to the caregiving challenge: it includes the Torah perspective on caregiving; practical, hands-on guidance about the medical, physical and emotional aspects of caregiving; personal accounts; advice and legal guidance; and a review of end-of-life challenges. The articles were written by rabbis, doctors, lawyers, mental-health professionals and laypeople, including Rabbi Paysach Krohn, Rabbi Eytan Feiner, Rabbi Moshe Meir Weiss, Rabbi Efrem Goldberg, Dr. Howard Leibowitz, Mrs. Rachel Schmidt, LCSW, Libi Astaire, Mr. Mark J. Kurzmann, Esq., and many others.

> In addition, the book includes a most valuable resource for anyone bringing an aide into their home to help care for a loved one: the pamphlet Welcome to our Jewish Home: The Home Health Aide's Guide to Basic Jewish Laws and Customs, which received the haskamah of Rabbi Yisroel Belsky, zt"l. This clearly written handbook can guide the aide

and help the caregiver to be as comprehensive as possible when instructing the aide in caring for their loved one.

It is our hope that When Caring Counts Most will empower, uplift and encourage caregivers, thereby helping them in their challenging role - and by extension, helping their loved one to receive the best care possible.

Starting the Day Right

In the earliest hours of the morning, when many are still fast asleep, a dedicated group of *talmidei chachamim* gathers, energized and ready to delve into their daily *seder* in *mishnayos Taharos*. This unique *chaburah* is the Chevrah Lomdei Mishnah morning Kollel, Zichron Avrohom Yitzchok. Founded eight years ago, participants initially learned a variety of subjects, with the unifying factor being that the learning took place before the 6:45AM *minyan* at the Coventry Shul in Lakewood. Today, that group has evolved into a cohesive *chaburah* learning a single *limud*; the fact that everyone is on the same page has enhanced the experience for everyone.

Participants attest that there is so much they gain here. They value the motivation to learn before *davening*, at a time when

most people do not manage to fit in another *seder*. But more than that, members of the group have discovered a whole new world of learning as they delve into this uncommon *limud* alongside their very capable peers.

Each week the *kollel* members complete another *perek*, so that by the week's end, they emerge with a clear understanding of the material, while still moving along at an impressive pace. Participants also benefit from the *chaburahs* presented by their erudite *rosh chaburah*. Their goal is to complete the entire *seder Taharos*. And after that? The other five *sedarim* of *mishnayos* await!

The Concise Laws of Shivah Including the Laws of Aninus

Yitzchak's father had just passed away. The days of shivah were emotion-laden, hectic, exhausting – and oftentimes, confusing as well. So many halachos needed to be observed, but there was so little time to consult with a rav – and in many cases, the sefarim Yitzchak consulted did not offer a definitive pesak halachah.

Yitzchak's experience is quite common. Often during the hectic

days of *shivah*, the *aveil* does not have the time or wherewithal to determine the answers to the numerous questions that arise. Furthermore, *aveilim* become frustrated when they consult the *sefarim* and books that address the laws of *aveilus* and find that they are none the wiser about what *to do* (or not to do), as there are disagreements amongst the *halachic* authorities in so many areas.

Two years ago, Chevrah Lomdei Mishnah published *Kitzur Hilchos Aninus: Basic Laws of Aninus*, which is presently available in three languages (English, Yiddish, and Spanish), besides the original Hebrew. These booklets are available free of charge from Chevrah Lomdei Mishnah and thousands have already been disseminated. When we saw how well-received this publication was, we realized it would be very helpful to publish a similar-style compilation of *hilchos aveilus*, specifically geared for the *aveil* to consult during the days of shivah.

Rabbi Tzvi Hebel, author of *The Neshamah Should Have an Aliyah*, was the perfect candidate to author this work, both the Hebrew version and its English translation. We were very fortunate to then secure the involvement of Rabbi Yaakov Forchheimer, senior *posek* in Beth Medrash Govoha of Lakewood. A capable *talmid*

chacham who edited the text presented Rabbi Hebel's writings to Rabbi Yaakov Forchheimer for review and did further research for even greater clarity when Rabbi Forchheimer deemed it necessary. Besides ensuring *halachic* accuracy, Rabbi Forchheimer placed great emphasis on finalizing with a conclusive *pesak halachah*.

The end result is an easily understandable pamphlet of *hilchos aveilus* to be used during the days of *shivah*, a most valuable commodity that can alleviate much uncertainty and aggravation during what is already an emotionally trying time.
